## "Let Not Your Hearts Be Troubled"

John 14:23-29 13 May 2007, 6 Easter C The Rev. Todd R. Goddard, pastor Zion West Walworth United Methodist Church

## John 14:23-29

Jesus answered him, "Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words; and the word that you hear is not mine, but is from the Father who sent me.

"I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid.

You heard me say to you, 'I am going away, and I am coming to you.' If you loved me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father, because the Father is greater than I. And now I have told you this before it occurs, so that when it does occur, you may believe.

Prayer.

It is said, "Be careful what you do, for our actions often have unintended consequences." No one knew this more than Judas, the unseen questioner in today's scripture passage. Jesus had just shared bread and cup, washed feet, and taught about servant leadership. Jesus had just out-ed Judas as the one who would betray him to the authorities. "After receiving the piece of bread, he immediately went out. And it was night." (John 13:30) Judas had done his bidding, and, while unrecorded, slipped back into the midst of the Upper Room gathering. Judas asks Jesus this question: "Lord, how is it that you will reveal yourself to us, and not to the world?" (John 14:22)

Likewise, a wise professor of Theology once said, "Be careful what you believe, for many of our beliefs also have unintended consequences." We say we believe in a God of mercy, for example, but as soon as mercy is lifted up, - say, mercy for the prisoner then crime victims rise up and cry, "Justice! What about justice?" A just God wouldn't allow people to become the victims of crime without any justice. Every belief comes with a price.

"Be careful what you believe, for many of our beliefs also have unintended consequences." So many of us have heaven on our minds 24-seven, three sixty-five. Eternal life is so pervasive, this hope and belief that when all Christians die,

we all go to heaven to live in eternal bliss, that we never take time to recognize the fact Jesus is talking about bringing the Heavenly Father back to us. Jesus isn't sending us to heaven; he is sending heaven to us, that he and the Heavenly Father will come to us, together with the Holy Spirit, to take up dwelling in our hearts. God will make his home with us, and in us. Heaven doesn't begin in some future time, but in the right here and now, when the Spirit of Pentecost, takes up habitation in each of our lives.

The unintended consequence is this: when we exercise our free will and think, say, or do something that is contrary to God's will, God is there. God is present when we decide to turn our back towards him. Remember that pick-up driver, who in a fit of rage, passes you and flips you the finger? God is there. Remember that text message you received during class, the one from your buddies that has the test answers? God is there. How about that fight you had with your spouse? God is there. Kicked the dog? It is just like kicking God.

Talk about pressure! This isn't peer pressure, that would be too easy. This is divine pressure to think, say, and do the right thing; the will of God.

But consider for a moment what God has at stake. When God moves into your house, into your life, into your heart; heaven is established in the here-and-now within you. A beach-head is created where upon God can begin to spread and grow his heavenly kingdom to others here on earth, just like we petition every time we innocently pray our Lord's Prayer.

You see. for the Christian, who has God dwelling within, the sting of death is removed. Other than the pain of a brief, momentary absence, death is relegated to third class status, or less. Death simply becomes the threshold across which we step when these temporal bodies wear out. But, we've already gone to heaven, because heaven began years ago when the Holy Spirit moved into our life and set up his temple.

There are many quotations and definitions concerning morality, but one aptly applies to our passage today: morality is what a person does in private, when nobody is looking,

as opposed to the actions done in public, before the eyes of others. When God is dwelling in you, and with you, there is no private time. There is no opportunity to be "just a little bit sinful." For God. the stakes are far to great. It is all or nothing. It is heaven or hell. The emergence of God's heavenly kingdom, on earth as it is in heaven, is ultimately dependent upon every one of us in whom God has taken up residence.

The chain is as strong as the weakest link. Quality management systems of today (you've heard of ISO 9000, haven't you?) ensure better quality in the products we buy. One in a million defects may be the threshold by which an organization takes pride, but if you are that one consumer in a million who got that defective part, one hundred percent of the products are flawed.

Likewise with God. When Jesus comes into our heart, the benefit of heaven begins to be revealed, but the responsibility that goes along with God's gracious gift is to lead a life that makes our guest proud, a life that is lived consistent with the will of God - a life befitting of a God who sees through our eyes

and works through our hands. If we allow ourselves to be that one defective part, just for a one little bit of self-gratification, we place at risk all of God's greater plan to bring God's kingdom on earth to completion. Breaking the will of God has unintended consequences that go far beyond what our feeble, little minds can comprehend. The risks we take for just a little mucking around in sin, are far too great, the consequences are far more than we are prepared to accept, that the call for righteous living - within whom dwells Christ can not be understated, can not be under emphasized, can not be ignored.

What we do, as well as what we believe, does makes a difference. Jesus is counting on you. And the reward? Oh, my. It is heavenly; and it begins today. Amen.
