"I Do What I Hate"
Romans 7:15-25a
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## Romans 7:15-25a

I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord! So then, with my mind I am a slave to the law of God, but with my flesh I am a slave to the law of sin.

## Prayer.

It would be very easy For the casual reader of our text To be led to believe That the apostle Paul is on the verge Of making some very important confession; Adultery, theft, or murder even. But we would be mistaken. We all know the story of Paul's background: Saul. His excess. Persecution of Christians. His Damascus road conversion, And his evangelistic travels. So he doesn't have much to confess. If we go backwards two chapters in Romans We find Paul speaking in the voice of Adam In an attempt to bring meaning To the universal experience of humanity.

Paul writes of sin, And he does so with the voice of Adam Once again.

He writes of sin. But in our world. The idea of sin has been so diluted So watered down It has all but disappeared.1 It is easy to observe That for many sin has been reduced to bad taste or a mistake - serving the wrong course at the wrong time at dinner or saying something embarrassing in a crowd. Sin has been so abstracted or so justified That pornography is a sin (which it rightly is). But adultery has become a bad choice.

God has bigger fish to fry

And He is working through Paul

To get the job done.

Paul's understanding of sin is far greater.

He isn't merely writing of a singular sin,

Or even multiple sins

That can somehow be totaled at the end of

And entered into some sort of ledger or record.

He is speaking of Sin

- with a capital "S"

as a significant force to be reckoned with.

Sin is the hurricane force storm

set against

humanity and God alike.

Sin destroys relationships with one

another.

And sin destroys our relationship with God.

Unlike the rest of us.

Paul correctly understands the power of

Sin:

It can make us do

Exactly that which we know we shouldn't.

Yes we know better,

But the flesh is willing

But our mind is weak.

Sin destroys everything in its sights.

Sin smashes our life,

Destroys our relationships,

And spits us out with a laugh,

Leaving us for dead.

Sin opposes God.

Sin fights just for the sake of fighting.

Sin wants everything God hates

And loves everything that God despises.

Willpower and conviction

May have a chance with individual acts of

lawless behavior.

But when it comes to Sin with a capital "S"

No amount of will is capable

Of righting the capsized boat

known as the human condition

The singular sin,

The isolated discretion.

Should be brought before the altar of God

(and when better than communion

Sunday?).

Confessed and repented,

Reparations need to be made.

And forgiveness should be freely and

liberally granted.

But the Sin that Paul is speaking about

Is a category 6 gale.

It will squash us like a bug.

Deliverance from Sin

Is much more than deliverance from a sin.

The solution requires much more than

Righteous living,

Eating your fruits and vegetables,

And supporting the party's conservative

political principles.

Deliverance from Sin

Has to come from outside ourselves.

"Who will rescue me from this body of

the Apostle Paul rhetorically asks.

"Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ

our Lord!"

Hallelujah!

Paul delivers up the correct answer.

Jesus is the only means of deliverance

From sin and death.

To be fully honest,

This rubs us the wrong way.

We affluent Americans don't like being

dependent

On someone, or something other than

ourselves

To make our way through life.

We are self-autonomous!

We are independent!!

We don't need any government help!

And we don't need God's.

What was that I just said? You heard correctly. Our actions speak louder than words. And our actions are saying That we need less and less church. Our actions are saying that we need less and less God. Our actions are saying "Thanks, but no thanks, Jesus." I don't want what you're selling." All I need is a bank account large enough To make every moment of life fun and entertaining. All I need is a 401(k) big enough So I can sail off into the sunset of retirement.

The only solution to the human condition of Sin

- with a capital "S" the only deliverance comes directly and solely from Jesus Christ our Lord.

For a society that takes sin with such a light-heartedness attitude it is difficult, if not nearly impossible, to recognize the sheer necessity of delivery. Perhaps like Paul, Only those who have experienced real delivery Can appreciate the true necessity of delivery at the saving hand of Jesus Christ. Perhaps this is why The public confession Made in the hymn "Amazing Grace" Is so endearing: "Amazing grace, how sweet the sound. that saved a wretch like me! I once was lost, but now am found;

Was blind, but now I see."2 Perhaps this is why The personal testimony Of a converted believer Can do more Than a hundred long-winded sermons.

Dearly beloved,

Swallow some pride And make your confessions For your sins Before this holy table. Swallow some pride And confess that the capital "S" sin in our - The sin or our human condition -Is beyond our ability to harness or control. Dearly beloved, Let us follow Paul's lead To speak with such a voice That is lifted up saying: "Who will rescue me from this body of death?" Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!"

"Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!" He is lifted up. And by his hand We are delivered. Amen.
