Signs First Sunday of Advent December 3, 2006 the Rev. Todd R. Goddard, pastor Zion West Walworth United Methodist Church

Luke 21:25- 36

'There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in a cloud" with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near.'

Then he told them a parable: 'Look at the fig tree and all the trees; as soon as they sprout leaves you can see for yourselves and know that summer is already near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that the kingdom of God is near. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life, and that day does not catch you unexpectedly, like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. Be alert at all times, praying that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before

Prayer.

The signs described by our gospel author are more than mere roadside sentinels warning approaching motorist of upcoming danger, peril, or hazard. The signs spoken of by Jesus will rock the cosmos. Signs in the sun! Signs in the moon! Signs in the stars! Signs in the heavens! All of creation will begin to sing. The whole universe will react to the Divine initiative as if a switch were thrown by an unseen hand. An inter-galactic, cosmic revolution is at hand!

Pay attention to the sign. If only it was that easy. It is easier said than done. Every generation since the time of Jesus has looked for the signs, just as he told us to. But, what exactly are we looking for? And, how will we know it when we see it? Will there be shooting stars? Will the moon turn orange or black? Will the sun cease to shine? Will the heavens be shaken like a damp salt shaker? For me, I am not satisfied with the shallow assurance of a seminary professor or parish pastor saying: "You'll know it when you see it."

Pay attention to the sign;

the roaring of the sea and the waves. In the two thousand year gap between when Jesus spoke and where we are today. there have been countless - countless hurricanes, storms, tsunamis, typhoons, and catastrophes; some big some small each, however, worthy of commanding the attention of those who were vigilant; each causing the faithful disciples of Jesus to wonder. "is this the sign we are seeking?" Pay attention to the sign: People will faint from fear and foreboding. As people stampede for sales, camp out in wind and rain for days with hopes of eBay dancing in their heads, shove their way butting ahead of the line stealing the last parking place with a squeal of the tires, even the most faithful can't help but wonder, can't help but be tempted, can't help relegating, this Advent and holiday season to just another year of commercialism and dysfunctional society. "Where are the ones fainting from fear and foreboding?" we ask with diminished hope and expectation that no matter what we do probably won't make a difference anyway. Well, Hal-leh-jingle-bell-freaking-lu-la. On this first Sunday of Advent

On this first Sunday of Advent let us pause and take a step back; look to John crying in the wilderness and a baby born in a manger, for, there was no room in the inn. Take a step back;

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listen to the heart's inner desire the movement that causes us to participate in pageant and cantata to read about light and Word to stand and hold a candle while singing "Silent Night." Take a step back; look beyond the twenty- fifth. Look to the day when you will cross the great divide arrive at heaven's far shore look back upon a completed earthly life and look forward to see the Savior's face.

Pay attention to the sign. Each sign points to the way each sign an intentional effort for our compliance each sign a proven, successful strategy given as a gift free and clear to you and me.

Jesus plants three signs for our benefit this holy day.

First,

remove the weight from your heart. Listen to his words: "Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life." In simpler words, watch! wait! do not allow your attention to be stolen! do not allow alcohol or drugs to snow you! do not allow anxiety to overcome you! do not worry about the things you can not change; worry only over one thing remaining focused on Christ and his kingdom.

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The second sign is simply this: pray for strength! Jesus tells his followers to pray, "that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before the Son of Man." Money won't make you strong. Toys and things won't make you strong. Strength only comes from faith and from the Lord above. Pray for strength, not success. Our success or failure is not our concern or consideration. A life built upon the sold rock of Jesus Christ is more than sufficient strength for that inevitable day when each of us will stand before the Son of Man. Third, and finally, Jesus tells us to "stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." Not one of us are going to take it sitting down! Stand up and look, lift your face. Lift your countenance with an attitude of expectation that this is the day. This is the day! This is the hour! This is the moment! This is not only the day the Lord has made; this is the day when the Son of Man returns. This is the time when we are redeemed; stolen from Satan's grasp and delivered before a loving God known and feared as judge, but embraced by those who know him as Savior.

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Unburden the heart. Pray for strength. Stand up, look up, be on guard. Behold, Christ has come Christ is come and Christ will come again. Amen.
